PERFECT PLAYOFF PLAN 16 Summary

Reorganization of Division I FBS football

Reforms the Div 1 FBS making it a new Major College Football Division (MCFD) with a 16 Team National Championship Playoff Series under the control of the NCAA and its member Schools. With a No Patsy Rule ending the scheduling of a 12th game with lower division opponents to pad a team's winning record. Ending the grouping of weaker teams together in the lower status Group of Five Conferences by instituting a No Cupcake Rule. Also ending the distinction of Automatically Qualified (AQ) or now Power 5 Conferences and the Independent Status of some Schools. Finally dropping the 40 uncompetitive teams from the 10 former FCS teams and the last 30 Cupcakes team from the Group of Five.

Restructures the former 130 Team FBS into a new 90 team Football Only Major College Football Division made up of 10 equal size and status single division Conferences of 9 teams each. Reducing the Regular Season to 11 games over 12 weeks ending the Saturday after Thanksgiving. Followed by the 16 team National Championship Playoff Series (NCPS) made up of the 10 Conference Champions and 6 Second Place teams with the most wins in a 4 Round single elimination Playoff. Beginning with 8 on-site home games on the 1st Saturday in December. Followed by Round 2 Quarter-Final Games in 4 Bowls on the 3rd Saturday in December. And the Round 3 Semi-Final Games in 2 Bowls on the 5th Saturday of December or 1st Saturday of January. Finishing in the National Championship Game on the Saturday after January 4th. Then the Post Season Bowl Competition (PSBC) starts after the 3rd Saturday in December and runs thru January 4th with 20 Bowls selecting from eligible teams not included in the Final 2 Rounds of the National Championship Playoff.

Realigns the 65 Power 5 Conference teams, Notre Dame and the <u>Top 25</u> teams from the Group of Five Conferences into 10 Conferences of 9 teams. These Conferences will share the <u>Best, Next and Last</u> teams so that they have Equal Status, Size and Strength of Programs in the new <u>Major College Football Division</u>.
